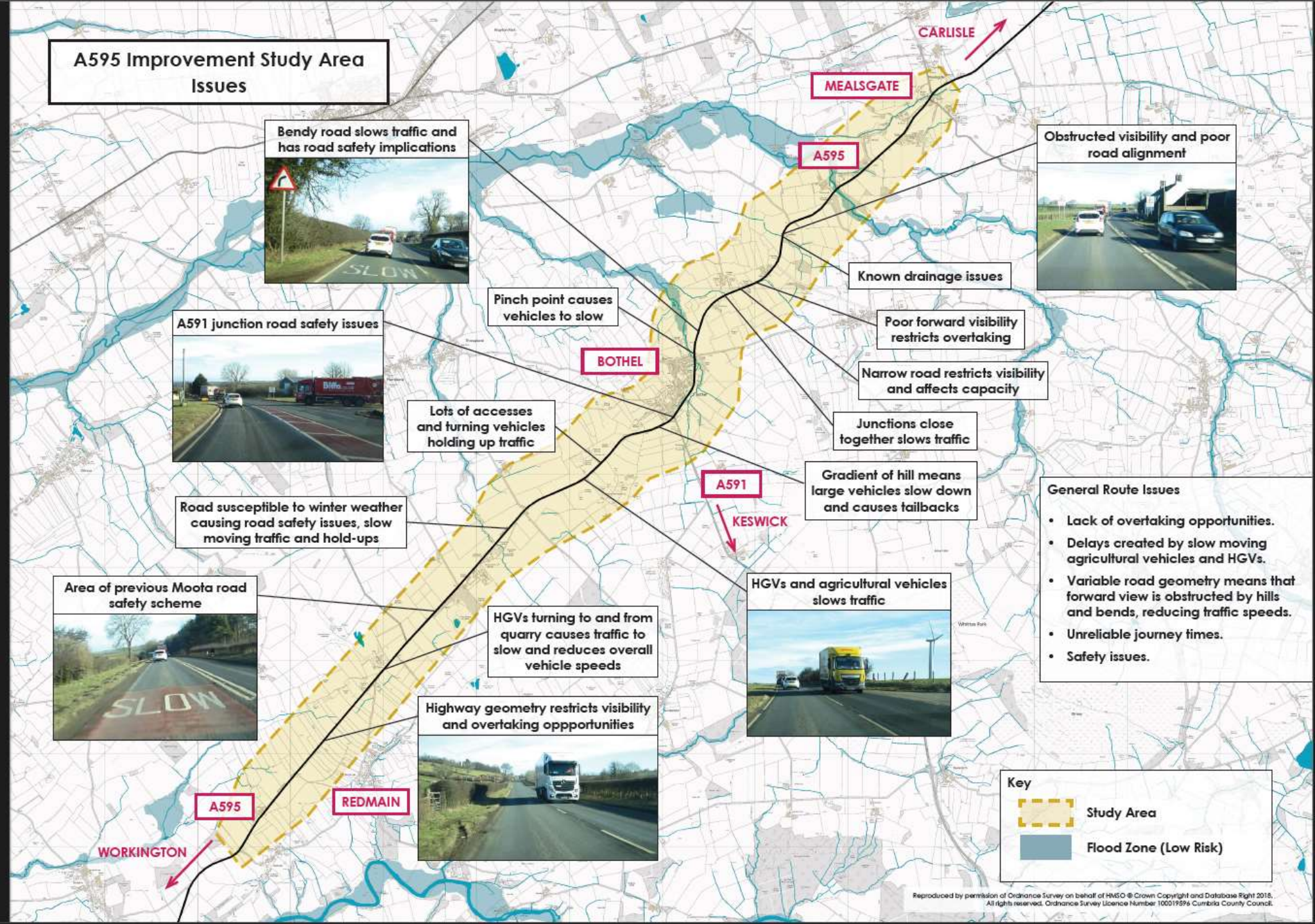

A595 Improvement Study Area Issues



Bendy road slows traffic and has road safety implications



Obstructed visibility and poor road alignment



A591 junction road safety issues



Pinch point causes vehicles to slow

Known drainage issues

Poor forward visibility restricts overtaking

Narrow road restricts visibility and affects capacity

BOTHEL

Lots of accesses and turning vehicles holding up traffic

Junctions close together slows traffic

Gradient of hill means large vehicles slow down and causes tailbacks

General Route Issues

- Lack of overtaking opportunities.
- Delays created by slow moving agricultural vehicles and HGVs.
- Variable road geometry means that forward view is obstructed by hills and bends, reducing traffic speeds.
- Unreliable journey times.
- Safety issues.

Road susceptible to winter weather causing road safety issues, slow moving traffic and hold-ups

HGVs turning to and from quarry causes traffic to slow and reduces overall vehicle speeds

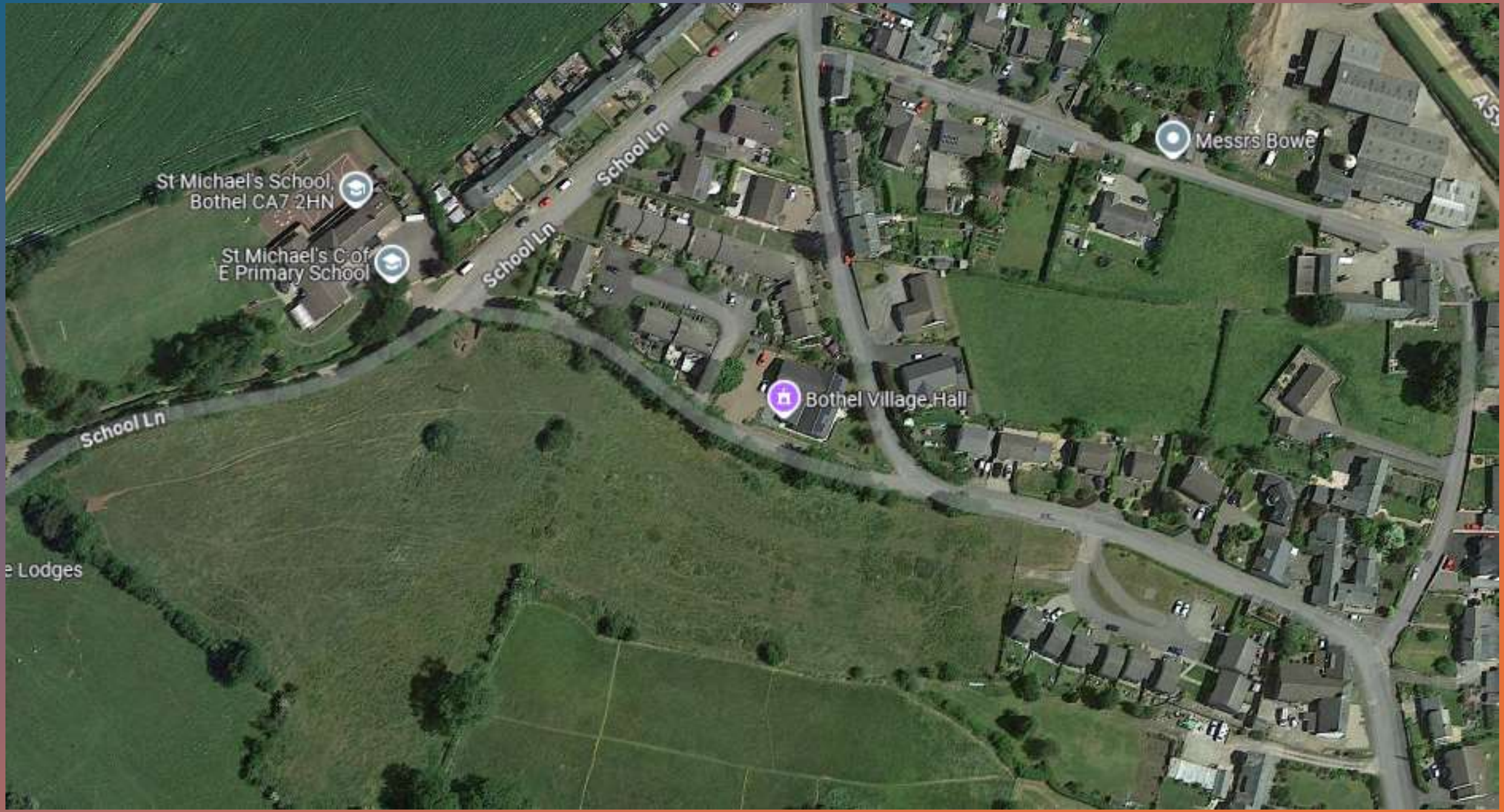



BIOBLITZ – MAY 2025

Park House Farm, Torpenhow, Cumbria

At 12pm on 10th May 2025 we will carry out a 24-hour Blitz of Park House farm, Torpenhow CA7 1JZ

Park house is a 350-acre regenerative dairy farm which aligns with pasture for life. The farm gained organic status in 2020 producing award winning cheese and gelato. Within the 350 acres there are many traditional ancient hedgerows, 25 acres of Atlantic woodland, Cockshot, Brow Tops and Thornscalemire, and also a section of Cockshot Beck.

The aim of the Bioblitz is for wildlife experts and the wider public to work together for an intense 24 hours of biological surveying in an attempt to record all living species within the farmland boundary.

The event will be informal and a fun way for young people and other members of the public to learn alongside experts to share and develop their enthusiasm for nature.

Supported by Cumbria Biodiversity Data Centre we aim to attract many knowledgeable recorders to help run sessions on recording and identification. We have the use of a large Three Hills former wedding barn which will be the base hub. Moth trapping, wildlife camera monitoring, bat surveying any tool to help identify the flora and fauna will be utilised.

We hope you would be able to share your expertise and join us to inspire nature awareness.
